If you are stuck for other book suggestions, we have included a few titles on the back of this letter. Again, please note that your student is free to choose any book to read this summer.

While reading, all students are encouraged to take brief notes, which they should bring to school in the fall. Students will be completing a writing assignment about the book in ELA, giving the teacher an opportunity to see the students' writing skills in the beginning of the year.

One other consideration: If your rising 6<sup>th</sup> grade student is participating in PAWS this summer, the teachers lead the students through the reading of *Bridge to Terabithia* by Katherine Paterson. This book is on the district-issued list and obviously would satisfy the reading requirement.
