ARP ESSER Health and Safety Plan Guidance & Template

Section 2001(i)(1) of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires each local education agency (LEA) that receives funding under the ARP Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website a *Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan*, hereinafter referred to as a *Health and Safety Plan*.

Based on ARP requirements, 90 percent of ARP ESSER funds will be distributed to school districts and charter schools based on their relative share of Title I-A funding in FY 2020-2021. **Given Federally required timelines, LEAs eligible to apply for and receive this portion of the ARP ESSER funding must submit a Health and Safety Plan that meets ARP Act requirements to the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) by Friday, July 30, 2021, regardless of when the LEA submits its ARP ESSER application.**

Each LEA must create a Health and Safety Plan that addresses how it will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff, and which will serve as local guidelines for all instructional and non-instructional school activities during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. The Health and Safety Plan should be tailored to the unique needs of each LEA and its schools and must consider public comment related to the development of, and subsequent revisions to, the Health and Safety Plan.

The ARP Act and U.S. Department of Education rules require Health and Safety plans include the following components:

1. How the LEA will, to the greatest extent practicable, implement prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning.
2. How the LEA will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services;

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3. How the LEA will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff and the extent to which it has adopted policies, and a description of any such policy on each of the following safety recommendations established by the CDC:
 - a. Universal and correct wearing of [masks](#);
 - b. Modifying facilities to allow for [physical distancing](#) (e.g., use of cohorts/podding) ;
 - c. [Handwashing and respiratory etiquette](#);
 - d. [Cleaning](#) and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving [ventilation](#);
 - e. [Contact tracing](#) in combination with [isolation](#) and [quarantine](#), in collaboration with State and local health departments;
 - f. [Diagnostic](#) and screening testing;
 - g. Efforts to provide COVID-19 [vaccinations to school communities](#);
 - h. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies; and
 - i. Coordination with state and local health officials.

The LEA's Health and Safety Plan must be approved by its governing body and posted on the LEA's publicly available website by July 30, 2021. * The ARP Act requires LEAs to post their Health and Safety Plans online in a language that parents/caregivers can understand, or, if it is not practicable to provide written translations to an individual with limited English proficiency, be orally translated. The plan also must be provided in an alternative format accessible, upon request, by a parent who is an individual with a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Each LEA will upload in the eGrants system its updated Health and Safety Plan and webpage URL where the plan is located on the LEA's publicly available website.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to review their Health and Safety Plans at least every six months during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. LEAs also must review and update their plans whenever there are significant changes to the CDC recommendations for K-12 schools. Like the development of the plan, all revisions must be informed by community input and reviewed and approved by the governing body prior to posting on the LEA's publicly available website.

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LEAs may use the template to revise their current Health and Safety Plans to meet ARP requirements and ensure all stakeholders are fully informed of the LEA's plan to safely resume instructional and non-instructional school activities, including in-person learning, for the current school year. An LEA may use a different plan template or format provided it includes all the elements required by the ARP Act, as listed above.

* The July 30 deadline applies only to school districts and charter schools that received federal Title I-A funds in FY 2020-2021 and intend to apply for and receive ARP ESSER funding.

How will the LEA, to the greatest extent practicable, support prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the CDC for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning?

The health and safety of the students, staff, and families of the Boyertown Area School District (BASD) remains, as always, a priority for the District. The BASD Board of School Directors, BASD Leadership Team, and community continue to take critical steps and make decisions that protect the health and safety of our District in the ongoing response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Expectations are based on the latest mandates issued by the Governor's Office, the Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH), the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE), the Department of Human Services (OHS), and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The BASD Leadership Team will continue to monitor communications. As conditions change related to COVID-19, protocols are subject to change.

In response to the expiration of statewide mitigation orders, the BASD has identified District standards and expectations which outline the protocols expected of all staff members as the District transitions forward. Protocols include the following:

- i. Self-screening for COVID-19 symptoms
- ii. Classroom seating charts are required across all grade levels
- iii. Following communicable disease reporting procedures
- iv. Practicing hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette
- v. Required use of universal indoor masking - Grades PreK – 6 for the first 13 school days. This protocol will be re-evaluated prior to the end of the 13 school day period.

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- vi. Optional use of universal indoor masking - Grades 7-12
 - o [CDC K-12 School Operational Strategy](#)
 - vii. Cleaning and disinfecting one's workspace.
 - viii. Maintaining physical distancing protocols to the maximum extent possible
 - ix. Staying informed of CDC's guidance relative to travel
 - x. Monitoring communication and confidentiality
 - xi. Participating in required training (current employees as well as new hires as part of their onboarding process)
 - xii. Staying informed and maintaining best practices
2. How will the LEA ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services?

BASD is returning to five days per week, full in-person instruction in the fall of 2021 pending any change in mandates from PDE/DOH. Along with in-person instruction, the BASD has developed their own Virtual Academy for families wishing to opt for this type of instructional model.

The BASD instructional model may shift between in-person and virtual depending on health circumstances as determined appropriate/necessary and/or as directed by DOH. BASD has applied for Flexible Instruction Days authorization and, if approved, will consider multiple factors of student and staff health, safety, and well-being when making decisions regarding instructional models.

BASD will continue to make resources available through an online training system. We are in the midst of a three-year implementation plan focused around SEL for students and staff, this includes staff wellness teams and initiatives, classroom instruction, and professional learning.

The following resolution passed at the BASD Board of School Directors meeting on July 27, 2021: "That the Board of School Directors approves the 2021-2022 Health and Safety Plan as presented, subject to granting authorization to the district administration to make reasonable modifications to the Plan to reflect changing safety and educational needs and requirements in order to proceed with reopening for the 2021-2022 school year."

Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding) ;</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • BASD will adhere to the latest mandates provided by PDE, DOH, and CDC, relative to physical distancing. • Physical distancing to the maximum extent feasible will continue to be recommended for indoor and outdoor spaces regardless of vaccination status. • In order to maintain in-person instruction five days per week, minimum physical distancing requirements will be hard to achieve in larger student populated buildings during lunch times. BASD will continue to place emphasis on the layered prevention strategies used to reduce the transmission of the COVID-19 Virus. • In anticipation of class sizes returning to full capacity in the fall of 2021 as allowed by program regulations and requirements, use of desk barriers will be available.

How BASD has solicited public comment on the 2021-2022 ARP/ESSR Health and Safety Plan

A Public Comment period was provided at the June 22, 2021 regular monthly voting meeting. Nine members of the community spoke on parents exercising their rights with regards to their children being required to wear masks. During this public meeting, a petition with over 400 names to make masks optional was also submitted to the administration/school board.

On July 13, 2021, the school board of directors held a Committee of the Whole meeting at which time the Pandemic Task Force Committee reviewed the proposed health and safety plan for the 2021-2022 school year. This provided another opportunity for public comment in relation to the development of the plan.

A draft of the 2021-2022 Health and Safety Plan was posted to the school districts website. BASD asked for public feedback leading up to the July 27, 2021 Board of Directors voting meeting. Public comment was collected via HealthAndSafety21-22@bovertownasd.org
