- Read to/with your child

- When practicing letters, numbers, or words, be sure to consider multiple ways of practicing to include movement and hands-on activities.
 - Practice writing on sandpaper, in a tray of rice, in shaving cream, etc.
 - Include letters, numbers, or words in a game of hopscotch or skywriting.
- Play a Speed Game
 - **Go Fish:** Make two cards for each power word. Give each player 7 cards. Players take turns asking another player for a certain card. The player must read the word when he/she asks for it. *Do you have "THAT?"* As you or your child gets a pair, the word is read and put down. Whoever has the most pairs wins.
 - **Memory:** Make 2 cards for each word. Lay all the words out facedown in a grid. Take turns turning over two cards and reading the words. If the words match and the child can read the word, he/she gets the match. Whoever gets the most pairs wins.
- Create a sidewalk word ladder using chalk
 - Practice reading and spelling skills and have fun outside at the same time with a chalk word ladder. Write out a word on each empty space of the ladder, and have your child start at the bottom. Each time he or she moves up the ladder, ask your child to sound out the word he or she lands on. When he or she reaches the top, turn around and do the ladder backward. You can also practice counting by swapping the words out for letters
